

Thousand Lakes Wilderness

Rugged lava and granite formations combined with dense groves of Lodgepole Pines characterize the atmosphere of the Thousand Lakes Wilderness Area. Improved hiking and riding trails weave through more than 16,000 acres, with elevations ranging from 5,000 to 9,000 feet. Although there are no improved campgrounds in the area, there are designated camping spots adjacent to some of the surrounding lakes.

Ishi Wilderness Area

Located about 20 miles northeast of Chico, the Ishi Wilderness Area offers more than 41,000 acres of diverse terrain for the outdoor adventurer. Backpackers and hikers can explore deep canyons, rugged lava formations and valley plateaus. There is only one improved campsite, with four units, however back country camping is available throughout - just be sure to pack out what you pack in! This wilderness area contains archaeological and historical resources representing nearly 4,000 years of occupation by the Yahi-Yana Indians and their ancestors. The park is named after Ishi, the last of the Yahi-Yana, who emerged from the wilds in 1911. Plumas National Forest

The Plumas National Forest is south of Lassen and immediately east of Oroville. This forest area offers an abundance of camping facilities and hiking trails for visitors who seek a quick getaway. There are numerous small lakes and reservoirs scattered throughout the area. Many of them are operated by the Pacific Gas & Electric Company. Most of the forest is open to vehicular camping and the campgrounds are open from June to early October. Fees are charged at maintained campgrounds that have developed water systems. Local ranger stations will provide campfire permits and more detailed information on each campground.

Feather River Ranger District



There are 18 major camping areas within this Ranger District. There are approximately 465 individual camping units as well as three group units with the capacity to hold up to 25 people each. In addition, a variety of hiking and backpacking trails provide access to back-country camping. Trails range from short and easy walking tours to lengthy routes with substantial elevation gains. Many streams cut across these trails and some trails are open to horses. Opportunities for fishing and boating are available. The Little Grass Valley Reservoir and many smaller lakes are located in the district.

Black Butte Lake

Black Butte Lake is another camping area close to Butte County that offers excellent fishing and boating. Its two developed campgrounds are maintained by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers. Both Buckhorn Campground and Orland Buttes Campground have sites for both tent and RV camping.

Lake Oroville

After a full day of fishing, swimming and boating at Lake Oroville, you can relax in one of the many campgrounds that surround the lake. New camping facilities, a 35-mile bike trail, improved boat ramps, equestrian campsites and floating campsites are just a few of the improvements that have been made at Lake Oroville. The two large campgrounds within the state recreation area are Bidwell Canyon and Loafer Creek. Together, these campgrounds offer 219 individual sites and six large group campsites. Bidwell Canyon also has trailer and motor home hookups.

Lassen National Forest

With over one million acres of land, Lassen National Forest is a haven for all outdoor enthusiasts. It is a perfect place for those who love to camp, fish, backpack and snap scenic photos. There are over 350 miles of maintained hiking and backpacking trails in the forest. About 130 of these miles fall along the Pacific Coast Trail. Campers have their choice of one of 49 maintained campsites that can accommodate more than 6,000 people at a time.

Highway 32 Area

By heading east on Highway 32 for about 35 miles, there are numerous campgrounds within Lassen National Forest awaiting the outdoor lover. The campgrounds along the highway tend to be small, and only the Potato Patch campground along Deer Creek has accommodations for RVs. At 3,600 feet, these sites are an ideal place for valley residents to escape the summer heat. Eagle Lake

Situated just outside of Butte County, within Lassen National Forest, is the spectacular Eagle Lake. Nestled in an isolated valley at 5,100 foot level of the Sierra Nevada mountains, the lake is about 15 miles long and covers over 22,000 acres. Caribou Wilderness

Tucked within the Lassen National Forest, Caribou is a rugged wilderness area relatively untouched by humans. It is known by many outdoor enthusiasts for the solitude it offers. Its 20,000 + acres, ranging in elevation from 6,000 to 8,300 feet, are open to adventurous backpackers and hikers. Although the entire area is open to camping, visitors have to pack in their supplies. There are no vehicle roads or improved campgrounds.
